

Bethphage: The "House of Unripe Figs" [pronounced "Bēth Paggē"] [https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Bethphage]
Distance: Bethany to the Garden of Gethsemane is approximately 1½-miles 'as the crow flies'.

The precise location of Bethphage is unknown; the general location is noted on the map. It may have been the name of a fig orchard.

¹ As they approached Jerusalem and came to Bethphage and Bethany at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples, ² saying to them, "Go to the village ahead of you, and just as you enter it, you will find a colt tied there, which no one has ever ridden. Untie it and bring it here. ³ If anyone asks you, 'Why are you doing this?' tell him, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here shortly.' "

¹⁰ "Blessed is the coming kingdom of our father David!" "Hosanna in the highest!" "Hosanna": a Hebrew expression meaning "Save!" became an exclamation of praise. Q4. Were the people expecting a political or a spiritual Messiah? Q5. Undoubtedly, the 'common' people had heard of the free fish and bread distributed at Jesus' outdoor services. Were the people, perhaps, expecting the Messiah to feed them, to heal them, from this point forward? **Psalm 118:26** Blessed is he who comes in the name of the LORD. Q6. To what "the coming kingdom of our father David" does this refer? (Vs. 10) Nathan the prophet received this revelation from the Lord about King David, "Your house and your kingdom will endure forever before me; your throne will be established forever." (2 Samuel 7:16 about 930 B.C.) David writes in Psalm 2:6-7, 12: "I have installed my King on Zion, my holy hill." ⁷ I will proclaim the decree of the Lord: He said to me, "You are my Son; today I have become your Father."... [See Acts 13:33] 12 Kiss the Son, lest he be angry and you be destroyed in your way... Blessed are all who take refuge in him. Acts 13:32-34 [The Apostle Paul was invited to speak to the assembly in the Jewish synagogue at Pisidian Antioch and Paul included the following teaching:] "We tell you the good news: What God promised our fathers 33 he has fulfilled for us, their children, by raising up Jesus. As it is written in the second Psalm: 'You are my Son; today I have become your Father.' ³⁴ The fact that God raised him from the dead, never to decay, is stated in these words: I will give you the holy and sure blessings promised to David." Jesus in the Temple

¹⁵ On reaching Jerusalem, Jesus entered the temple area and began driving out those who were buying and selling there. He overturned the tables of the money changers and the benches of those selling doves, ¹⁶ and would not allow anyone to carry merchandise through the temple courts.

John 2:14-17 [Theologians attribute the "temple cleansing" in John, chapter two, as the first cleansing and those mentioned in Matthew, Mark, & Luke as the second.] ¹⁴ In the temple courts he found men selling cattle, sheep and doves, and others sitting at tables exchanging money. 15 So he made a whip out of cords, and drove all from the temple area, both sheep and cattle; he scattered the coins of the moneychangers and overturned their tables. ¹⁶ To those who sold doves he said, "Get these out of here! How dare you turn my Father's house into a market!" ¹⁷ His disciples remembered that it is written: "Zeal for your house will consume me." [Psalm 69:9]

But because of the Pharisees they would not confess their faith for fear they would be put out of the synagogue; 43 for they loved praise from men more than praise from God.

And he who searches our hearts knows the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints [Believers] in accordance with God's will. Q26. If I, a Believer, prayed, "Lord, please help me buy a new Corvette, because I want to impress my neighbors. Amen", do you think the Lord would be honored by such a request? The Authority of Jesus Questioned

Luke 20:45-47 While all the people were listening, Jesus said to his disciples, 46 "Beware of the teachers of the law. They like to walk around in flowing robes and love to be greeted in the marketplaces and have the most important seats in the synagogues and the places of honor at banquets. ⁴⁷ They devour widows' houses and for a show make lengthy prayers. Such men will be punished most severely." [Also Mark 12:38-40]

²⁷ They arrived again in Jerusalem, and while Jesus was walking in the temple courts, the chief priests, the teachers of the law and the elders came to him. ²⁸ "By what authority are you doing these things?" they asked. "And who gave you authority to do this?"

What activities of Jesus might the Jewish religious authorities be questioning?
